

There's more than 300 interactive items: you can watch a tornado grow or study a clock's inner workings. Plan on staying for an entire afternoon.

The Moscow Polytechnic Muse-



um's original building is in the process of being renovated so it is temporarily housed at Pavilion 26 at VDNKh Park. The exhibition displays the greatest achievements of Russian science, from the first radio to a prototype TV to a nuclear bomb. You can also see some cool holograms and mock-ups of future lunar and Mars settlements. There are a lot of hands-on exhibits for

budding scientists to explore, and everything is labeled and described in English as well as Russian. Don't miss the earth-shaking nuclear explosion.

ZOOLOGICAL MUSEUM OF MOSCOW UNIVERSITY A TREAT FOR TAXIDERMY FANS

The Zoological Museum was founded as part of Moscow State University, but it was opened to the public in 1866. It's a time capsule of sorts. There are squiggly things in jars and stuffed things standing about, with many labels not replaced since Soviet times so they still specify the natural habitat of certain species as "the south of the U.S.S.R." It's a real treat for taxidermy fans — some

of the specimens were gathered more than 150 years ago.

MOSCOW PLANETARIUM A TRIP TO THE STARS

The Moscow Planetarium opened a few years ago after a major renovation. It uses a state-of-the-art Universarium projector to show an accurate image of the night sky. There's also a small museum about the history of astronomy and some of its latest achievements.




FOOD FROM U.S.S.R. IN A SPACESHIP

Voskhod is a new restaurant by one of Moscow's most prominent restaurateurs Alexander Rappoport, located in the newly built Zaryadye Park right next to the Kremlin and St. Basil's Cathedral. Voskhod focuses on dishes from the 15 former Soviet republics with decor that looks like a Soviet-made spaceship. Enjoy great views of the Moscow River as you dine. Stop by the little cafe on your way to or from the Pushkin Museum for a slice of artichoke and calamari (520 rubles) or salami and broccoli pinza (440 rubles) and a great Italian coffee (cappuccino - 200 rubles).

It's probably been a while since you have seen chia, kale, or seitan on a Moscow menu, and if these words make you long for a salad not comprised of mayonnaise and potatoes, pull on your yoga pants and head to Fresh. Aside from salads (295 - 680 rubles), you can find bean burgers (395 - 550 rubles), burritos (spicy means spicy, 450 - 600 rubles), and fresh juices (250ml, 375 rubles). The restaurant now has two venues in the city and provides catering.

VEGAN STAND IN UPSCALE MOSCOW MARKET

Danilovsky market houses many of Moscow's finest food start-ups, most occupying no more than a small stand, and Mokh ("moss" in English), sandwiched between an Indian stall and a crab joint, might be the hippest of them all. Its all-vegan menu changes often, but if you're not lucky enough to find tom yum soup (300 rubles), you can still count on kombucha on tap (200ml, 100 rubles).

ANUPDATED SPRING CLASS

FROM CHEF VLAD PISKUNOV OF MATRYOSHKA

veryone knows how to make vinegret: cut up boiled vegetables and pickles, dress with oil, and plop it on the table. But Russian vinegret (not the French salad dressing vinaigrette) has been made in Russia since the 18th century and was originally a mixture of all kinds of products. In my recipe, I bake the root vegetables in foil under ashes and dress them with a classic French vinaigrette. I personally like to make vinegret with whole sprats or herring. In the restaurant, we always add a few salted mushrooms.



INGREDIENTS

- 2 beets
- 3 potatoes
- 3 carrots
- 1 onion
- 200 g fresh or frozen peas
- 3 pickles, salted or marinated
- 3-4 springs of dill
- 70 ml vegetable oil
- 2 Tbsp apple cider vinegar
- 1 Tbsp lemon juice
- 1 tsp mustard
- 1 Tbsp sugar and salt to taste

INSTRUCTIONS


- 1. Scrub the carrots and beets and wrap in foil. Prick with a fork and put on hot coals in a stove or grill and cover with ashes. Bake until they are done. Boil potatoes.
- 2. Use tongs to remove the foil-wrapped carrots and beets. Take them out of the foil and place them directly on the coals or grill for 10 minutes so they get a smoky flavor.
- **3.** Put the green peas in salted boiling water and wait until the water

comes to a boil again. Immediately take off the heat, strain and rinse with cold water.

- 4. Take the vegetables out of the stove (off the grill) and cool to room temperature. Peel them and the onion.
- 5. Dice the root vegetables and pickles; dice the onion finely; mince the dill. Mix all the vegetables except for the beets in a large bowl. Put the diced beets in a separate bowl, dress with a
- couple of spoonfuls of vegetable oil and mix to coat well. This way the beets won't "weep" in the salad.
- 6. Make the dressing: in a small bowl or mixer, blend the vinegar and lemon juice. Add the salt, sugar, mustard and mix well. Add a small amount of vegetable oil and whip until emulsified.
- 7. Pour the dressing into the large bowl with vegetables. Mix, add the beets, and mix well again.

he snow may be hip-deep and sunbathing the last thing on your mind, but if you want to rent a dacha this summer, March is a good time to start looking.

First Things First

Before you even begin your search for a dacha, you have to decide a number of issues. Are you or is someone in your family going to live there full-time during the summer, or is this just for weekends? Do you have a car? Are you planning to always drive to the dacha or would you take a commuter train or bus? If you are a one-car family, will the car stay at the dacha or go into the city on most days?

Do you want to live in the heart of a community or away from other houses? Do you want to be near a swimming spot or woods? Do you want a wooded lot or open space? Do you want to grow flowers or vegetables? Do you want a lot of land or just a yard? Do you need it fenced in?

What level of comfort do you want? Do you want to get away from it all at a dacha with spotty or no electricity, no Wi-Fi, outdoor plumbing, a well, and a "summer kitchen" (a separate structure with a stove and sometimes water)? Or do you want to rent a suburban house with all the modern amenities?

Once you've thought this through, you'll know what to look for, like a dacha that is walking distance from a train station and shops (if the family car will stay in the city), or reliable Wi-Fi and satellite television (if you are in business and need to stay in touch with the world).

The next issue is which direction from Moscow. If you live in the northeast of Moscow, you don't want a dacha 30 kilometers out of the city to the southwest — that would add one to three hours driving time. Most people draw a "pizza slice" on a map with the center point at their apartment and the crust at their preferred maximum number of kilometers out of the city. That's their search zone.

And then — how much can you pay? The smallest house with no modern conveniences might cost 15,000 rubles a month (or less); a modest dacha with some or all conveniences averages 25-60,000 rubles a month; a modern suburban-type house starts at about 100,000 rubles a month and goes up from there. The season is three to five months (May through September), and sometimes there is a security deposit (one half to one month's rent). If you go through a realtor, you will have to pay a commission (from a third to one month's rent).

All in the Family

People are sentimental about their dachas, which for decades were the only approximation of private property and places that represent the joys and freedoms of summer. Many dacha owners prefer to rent to someone they know, even if it's a friend of a friend of a friend. In some cases, dachas are passed around at businesses — a dacha that is always rented by whoever heads a particular company, or that is passed around a group of foreign friends.

So once you have a general idea of the region you want to be in, drive around and note any dacha communities you like. And then ask around. In fact, ask everyone you know, especially older folks. At the dacha villages you like, walk around and talk to the residents or local shop clerks, who tend to know everything about their customers (and willing to share their information for a finder's fee).

The best person to help you is the dacha village's unofficial caretaker. There's always a man who lives nearby year round and keeps an eye on dachas in return for a few hundred rubles a month. He knows which dachas are empty, who is having financial problems, who is going to Crimea for the summer, and so on. Offer a finder's fee and see what he turns up.

Search the Web

If you aren't looking for a high-end property, forget agents and instead search on one of Moscow's many real estate websites. The best sites for dachas are cian.ru, www.gdeetotdom. ru, avito.ru/rossiya/nedvizhimost, domofond. ru, and www.irr.ru. The real estate forum on expat.ru has a few offerings (and is in English). Even if your Russian is poor, you can still figure out square footage, price and number of rooms. Some bargaining is possible. And then: head out to your dacha, kick off your shoes, and relax.

Inspect the property (which may look quite different from the online photos). Check everything and make sure you understand what will be included in the price and what you can do on the property (like garden or set up a kiddie pool).

- Test drive at rush hour. A dacha that is 35 minutes away at midnight might be three hours away on a weekday morning.
- Test the cell phone reception, Wi-Fi, and other amenities. Check cell phone provider maps to find the best coverage (or to determine the provider to buy your plug-in modem from).
- Ask about the neighbors or talk to them; a group of rowdy party animals next door will ruin your country idyll.
- Sign a contract.

DON'T Sign a contract or hand over money before you see the property.

• Pay the entire summer's rent ahead of time.



t's time to crawl out of your winter den and start exploring Moscow. If your language skills aren't up to a tour in Russian, try tours and club activities in English. These are a great way to learn something new and make some new friends.

Enjoy a drink or coffee in the lobby, or have a drink and snack in the rooftop 02 Lounge with its astonishing view over the Kremlin and Red Square, before dining on Pan-Asian cuisine in the Novikov Restaurant and Bar. The hotel has a particularly fine spa and health club, not to mention modern, flexible meeting space. The ballroom is a popular spot for weddings and other festivities.

BAKU FAIRYTALE CITY ON THE CASPIAN SHORE

ust three hours by plane and you are in Baku, a city that has shed its Soviet heritage and embraced its new role as a booming oil town on the Caspian Sea.



Walk the crooked cobbled streets of the walled Old City, which is a UNESCO World Heritage site. Don't miss the wonderfully restored Maiden Tower and Palace of the Shirvanshahs.

Stroll down the wide green boulevard along the seashore and check out the new skyscrapers, as well as late 19th- early 20th century architec-

ture. One such opulent mansion now houses the Historical Museum.

The Azerbaijan Carpet Museum will tell you more about carpets than you ever wanted to know, while the dream-like Heydar Aliyev Center by Zaha Hadid hosts contemporary art shows.

If you have time, take a drive to Gobustan—a national park with prehistoric petroglyphs and lunar landscapes with mud volcanoes and stunning views of the Caspian.

ROSTOV

THE GOLDEN RING

ostov is great to visit at any time of the year. It's also one of the easiest to reach cities of the Golden Ring route, a string of small but historically important cities north-

east of Moscow. Just hop on a regular commuter train and it will get you there in less than three hours.

It's not clear exactly when Rostov was founded, but its first mention in the Chronicles is dated 862. Before that it was part of the Finno-Ugric lands. The city, built on the shores of Lake Nero, quickly rose to prominence. It first became the capital of the Rostov-Suzdal princedom and then the center of the independent Rostov princedom. After the Tatar-Mongol invasion, Rostov became part of growing Muscovy.

The main sight in Rostov is the 17th-century Kremlin, about a 20-minute walk from the train station. It wasn't built as a proper Kremlin, i.e. a defensive fortress, but rather as the seat of power for the local religious authority — the Metropolitan. It's a museum now, with a great collection of icons and religious artifacts, as well as "finift" — enameled miniatures, a local specialty.

The best place to stay is within the Kremlin walls at the the Hotel na Pogrebakh ("above the cellars"). It's located in a renovated 17th century building, and gives you 24-hour access to the majestic Kremlin grounds.

KAZAN

MULTI-CULTURAL METROPOLIS ON THE VOLGA

azan is the capital of the republic of Tatarstan and one of the most unique cities in Russia. Ivan the Terrible's campaign of 1552 put an end to the Kazan Khanate, but the region retains its distinct cultural and religious identity. Mosques and Orthodox churches are scattered all over the city, and a formidable-looking Kremlin sits up on a hill overlooking the



Volga. Start your tour of the Kremlin with the recently built Qol Sharif mosque, the 16th-century Annunciation Cathedral and the "leaning" Suyumbike tower. A great place to stay is the Center Hotel Kazan Kremlin (6 Ulitsa Karla Marksa), right next to the Kremlin walls.

Check out the walking street Ulitsa Baumana and try some Tatar cuisine, including traditional "echpochmak" triangle pies and the honey-covered fried dough dessert called "chak chak." Climb the tall bell tower of the Epiphany Cathedral for great views of the city, or walk along the winding canal-like Bulak River. Spend some time at Smena – a bookstore doubling as an art gallery and a coffee shop. The Tatarstan State Museum of Fine Arts has a good collection of avant-garde art and local icons.

If you have time for a day trip, head out to the island city of Sviyazhsk, which was founded by Ivan the Terrible as the launching ground for his attack on Kazan. Now it's a quiet museum town with 16th and 17th century churches and monasteries

ZAVIDOVO

PRESIDENTIAL RECREATION

avidovo is a village and a nature reserve just 100 kilometers from Moscow, located in one of the most environmentally clean corners of the world, according to UNESCO. It's best known for being the official residence of the Russian president. Zavidovo has enjoyed the attention of Russia's leaders for a long time — in fact, there's evidence that Ivan the Terrible's hunting lodge was located somewhere in the area. During the Soviet era it became known as the "Politburo hunting reserve."

Radisson Resort & Residences Zavidovo is a hotel complex that stands right on the bank of the river Doibitsa, close to its confluence with the Volga. A holiday at Zavidovo best suits those who appreciate nature and privacy in combination with good service and comfort.
